****Review of "Resilience Under Occupation: Mixed-Development Indicators of the West Bank and Gaza (1995-2023)"****

\\ \\ ****Step 1. Summary of the Paper**** This manuscript examines development outcomes in the West Bank and Gaza from 1995 to 2023, focusing on the paradox where improvements in human development indicators (e.g., literacy, life expectancy) coexist with economic stagnation under occupation. The authors employ a mixed-methods approach, integrating quantitative analysis of World Bank development indicators with qualitative thematic analysis of development discourse. The paper claims to contribute by: (1) documenting the "resilience paradox" through empirical data, (2) integrating epistemic justice and capability approaches to analyze local agency, and (3) offering methodological triangulation to bridge macro-level trends with micro-level narratives. The findings suggest that education and community networks foster resilience, while international aid frameworks often perpetuate dependency despite local adaptations.

\\ \\ ****Step 2. Evaluation Criteria****

\\ \\ \\ ****1. Originality / Novelty**** - ****Critique****: The topic of Palestinian development under occupation is well-trodden, but the extended temporal scope (1995–2023) and integration of epistemic justice with quantitative data offer a modest novelty. However, the theoretical frameworks (Sen, Fricker) are applied predictably, and the "resilience paradox" is not entirely new—similar arguments exist in conflict development literature. - ****Score****: 6/10

Scientific Rigor / Methodology**** - ****Critique****: - ***Quantitative***: Reliance on aggregated World Bank data lacks granularity (e.g., subregional disparities, informal economy metrics). Correlation analysis is rudimentary and does not establish causality. - ***Qualitative***: The use of published documents (e.g., NGO reports) risks selection bias and lacks primary data (e.g., interviews) to capture lived experiences directly. - ***Ethics***: No mention of ethical approval for qualitative data, though sources are public. - ****Score****: 5/10

\\ \\ \\ ****3. Clarity \ Presentation**** - ****Critique****: The writing is clear but overly descriptive, with repetitive emphasis on "paradox" and "resilience." Tables are informative but lack statistical nuance (e.g., confidence intervals). The abstract overstates methodological rigor, and the conclusion

vaguely calls for "epistemic justice" without concrete operationalization. - **Score**: 6/10

\\\\ **4. Reproducibility \ Transparency** - **Critique**: Methods are described generically (e.g., "thematic analysis following Flick 2014"), but the qualitative data (e.g., specific documents, coding scheme) are not shared. No mention of data/code availability for quantitative analysis. Statistical methods (e.g., Pearson correlation) are basic but insufficiently detailed (e.g., handling of missing data). - **Score**: 4/10

\\\\ **5. Significance \ Impact** - **Critique**: The work addresses an important problem—development under political constraints—but offers incremental insights. The policy implications (e.g., "rethink aid frameworks") are broad and lack specificity. Experts may find the mixed-methods approach useful but underwhelmed by the execution. - **Score**: 5/10

\\\\ **6. Ethics \ Integrity** - **Critique**: No evidence of plagiarism or data manipulation. However, the omission of primary qualitative data collection raises concerns about depth and authenticity. Limitations are acknowledged but downplayed (e.g., reliance on secondary data). - **Score**: 7/10

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\\ **Step 3. Specific Suggestions for Improvement**

\\\\ **Major Flaws**: 1. **Methodological Weaknesses**: - Conduct primary qualitative research (e.g., interviews/focus groups) to complement document analysis. - Enhance quantitative rigor with regression models controlling for confounders (e.g., political events, aid volatility). 2. **Theoretical Superficiality**: Deepen the application of epistemic justice by examining how power asymmetries shape data collection itself (e.g., whose narratives are archived). 3. **Overstated Claims**: Reconcile the "resilience paradox" with critiques of neoliberal development (e.g., how "resilience" may mask systemic oppression).

\\\\ **Minor Flaws**: - Reduce jargon (e.g., "epistemic resilience"). - Include confidence intervals or p-values in tables. - Clarify the sample size for qualitative data (e.g., how many narratives were analyzed).

\\\\ **Additional Analyses**: - Disaggregate data by gender, refugee status, or rural/urban divides to explore intersectional resilience. - Compare pre- and post-2007 (Hamas takeover) trends to assess political shocks. - Incorporate metrics on mental health or social cohesion to enrich "human development."

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\\ **Step 4. Final Decision \ Justification**

- **Overall Score**: 5/10 - **Recommendation**: **Reject** - **Justification**: While the topic is timely and the mixed-methods ambition commendable, the manuscript suffers from critical methodological flaws. The qualitative analysis relies solely on secondary sources, undermining its claim to center "lived experiences," and the quantitative approach is descriptive rather than analytical. The theoretical contributions are incremental, and the policy recommendations lack actionable specificity. For a high-impact journal, the study requires substantial revision—particularly primary data collection and robust statistical analysis—to meet standards of rigor and novelty.

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****Confidential Note to Editor**:** This paper aligns with the journal's scope but currently reads like a comprehensive literature review rather than a novel empirical contribution. If the authors address the major methodological issues, a resubmission could be reconsidered.

****Review of "RESILIENCE UNDER OCCUPATION: MIXED-DEVELOPMENT INDICATORS OF THE WEST BANK AND GAZA (1995–2023)"****

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\\ ****1. Overall Impression**** ****Immediate Reaction:**** This manuscript presents an ambitious mixed-methods analysis of Palestinian development under occupation. While the topic is timely and important, the execution raises significant methodological and analytical concerns. The paper attempts to bridge quantitative trends with qualitative narratives but falls short of rigorous integration. The central "paradox" of development progress amid economic stagnation is intriguing but insufficiently substantiated.

****Breakthrough vs. Incremental:**** This feels like an incremental contribution repackaged as a novel analysis. The core observation—that human development indicators can improve despite economic constraints—is not new to development literature. The theoretical framing (epistemic justice, capability approach) is applied rather than innovated.

****First Impression Strengths:**** - Important and politically relevant topic - Long temporal scope (1995–2023) - Attempts methodological triangulation

****First Impression Concerns:**** - Superficial quantitative analysis - Questionable qualitative methodology - Weak integration between methods - Overstated claims of novelty

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\\ ****2. Technical \ Scientific Assessment****

****A. Problem Definition: 3/5**** - The research questions are clearly stated and motivated by the Palestinian context. - The "paradox" framing is conceptually interesting but not sufficiently novel. - The justification for why this specific time period matters is adequate but could be stronger.

****B. Methodological Soundness: 2/5**** - ****Quantitative Methods:**** Basic descriptive statistics and correlations are insufficient for causal claims. No regression analysis, no controls for confounding variables, no consideration of autocorrelation in time series data. - ****Qualitative Methods:**** Analysis of existing documents without primary data collection lacks depth. Purposive sampling of 45 documents over 28 years is sparse. No clear coding framework or inter-coder reliability measures. - ****Integration:**** Claims of "triangulation" are superficial. The methods run parallel rather than truly integrating.

****C. Results \ Evidence: 2/5**** - ****Quantitative Results:**** Tables show basic trends but lack statistical rigor. Correlation matrix ignores temporal dependencies. No significance testing reported despite $p < 0.05$ claim. - ****Qualitative Evidence:**** Four themes are presented without sufficient supporting evidence from the data. No illustrative quotes or detailed examples. - ****Baselines:**** No comparison to other occupied territories or conflict-affected regions. Limited contextualization within broader development literature.

****D. Contribution to the Field: 2/5**** - The application of epistemic justice to Palestinian devel-

opment has been explored elsewhere. - Methodological approach does not advance mixed-methods literature. - Findings largely confirm existing scholarship rather than breaking new ground.

E. Writing \ Presentation: 3/5 - Generally well-written but overly abstract in places. - Tables are clear but lack methodological detail. - Structure follows conventional social science format.

F. Ethical \ Transparency Standards: 2/5 - No IRB mentioned for analysis of human narratives. - No data/code availability statement. - Heavy reliance on secondary sources raises questions about original analysis.

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3. Strengths - Addresses an important and understudied aspect of development under occupation - Longitudinal scope provides valuable temporal perspective - Attempts to bridge quantitative and qualitative approaches - Engagement with relevant theoretical frameworks

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4. Weaknesses

Major Flaws: 1. **Methodological Superficiality:** Quantitative analysis stops at descriptive statistics; qualitative analysis lacks depth and rigor. 2. **Integration Failure:** Claims of mixed-methods integration are not substantiated in the analysis. 3. **Overstated Novelty:** Framing as a "paradox" overstates what is essentially a documented phenomenon in development economics. 4. **Lack of Comparative Context:** No comparison to other conflict-affected regions limits generalizability. 5. **Theoretical Application Rather Than Innovation:** Uses existing frameworks without extending them.

Minor Flaws: - Inconsistent citation format (some references lack full details) - Tables lack standard errors or confidence intervals - Abstract promises more than the paper delivers - Vague descriptions of qualitative analysis procedures

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5. Recommendations for Improvement

Required Revisions: 1. **Strengthen Quantitative Analysis:** - Add time series analysis with proper controls - Include regression analysis with relevant covariates - Address potential confounding variables (e.g., demographic changes)

2. **Enhance Qualitative Component:** - Conduct primary interviews or focus groups - Provide detailed coding framework with examples - Demonstrate analytical process more transparently

3. **Improve Integration:** - Show exactly how quantitative and qualitative findings inform each other - Use joint displays or other mixed-methods integration techniques - Address points of divergence between methods

4. **Contextualize Findings:** - Compare with other occupied territories (e.g., Western Sahara, Kashmir) - Engage more critically with existing literature on development under conflict

For Future Submission: - Primary data collection essential for qualitative claims - Advanced statistical methods needed for quantitative analysis - Clearer demonstration of methodological innovation - More modest claims about novelty and contribution

\\\ **6. Verdict**

Overall Score: 2/5 - Weak Reject

Justification: While the topic is important and the research questions are valid, the methodological execution is fundamentally flawed. The quantitative analysis lacks sophistication, the qualitative component is underdeveloped, and the integration between methods is superficial. The paper makes strong claims about contributing to theory and methodology that are not supported by the evidence presented. The authors would need to substantially revise both the methodological approach and analytical depth to make this paper suitable for a Tier-1 venue. The current version reads more like a preliminary study than a mature research contribution.

** Reviewer 2 Style Enforcement:** This paper fails to meet the burden of proof for its central claims. The authors must provide stronger methodological justification, more rigorous analysis, and clearer demonstration of novelty to warrant publication in a high-impact journal. The current version does not meet the standards expected for Nature, BMJ, or CVPR equivalent venues in social science.

Review completed in skeptical Reviewer 2 mode. Authors should address fundamental methodological concerns before resubmission.
